## Address of Outgoing President Shunji Murai

Distinguished Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen!

It is my gratitude to congratulate all players present here to make the Vienna Congress successful. Particularly I would like to express my sincere congratulation to Congress Director, Professor Karl Kraus and his team for excellent arrangements of the Congress. We will miss the beautiful city of Vienna and the rich European culture.

Twelve years ago, in 1984, I was ratified at the Rio de

Janeiro Congress as the Congress Director of the Kyoto Congress in 1988 with the votes of the colleagues of South America who formerly were my competitors for such a long time. This is a real international community.

Eight years ago, in 1988, I organised the 16th ISPRS Congress in Kyoto. I was very tired in many aspects, particularly concerning fund raising. Actually I wanted to resign the ISPRS affairs. But I was elected Secretary General at Kyoto Congress. However very luckily I succeeded in getting a big surplus at Kyoto Congress, that has become a big financial support for my tasks as the Secretary General (1988-1992) and the President (1992-1996). I have to thank Japan Society of Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing for its full support to my duties. I am sure this helped ISPRS from the financial crisis.

My biggest difficulty was the time as Secretary General. I did not know how tough the Secretary General's job became during these past four years. Without him, the Society could not survive.

Four years ago, at the Washington Congress in 1992, I was elected as ISPRS-President, the first president from Asia. Many people watched my job. Some people might have doubted my leadership. But I decided four years ago that I will never be such a president who does not do anything. My experience as General Secretary of Asian Association on Remote Sensing since 1981, helped me for bringing new wind to ISPRS. My new appointment at the Asian Institute of Technology, Bangkok, Thailand, for three of these four years also helped me to understand the requirements of developing countries.

I dare to tell my five initiatives as ISPRS-Council Member and as Asian representative in ISPRS because this will be the last chance to report my achievements to you.

- I introduced more soft and frank human relation to ISPRS in the Asian way. This would bring co-operation rather than fighting in ISPRS affairs.
- I succeeded in opening the Society to any persons and any organisation who wish to join ISPRS. The ISPRS General Assemblies of the Kyoto Congress approved the new type of "Associate Membership". Out of the first five admitted Associate Members four came from Asia. The tradition of ISPRS, which is democratic spirit and open attitude, is well promoted by the Council.
- I initiated the Young Author's Award in order to encourage the young generation to challenge their dreams. I also initiated the Best Poster Award at the Kyoto Congress in 1988. I am pleased to know that this has been continued during the following Congresses.
- I publicised ISPRS in Asia and Pacific Region through the activities of Asian Association on Remote Sensing, to which I have served as a Secretary General for 15 years, since 1981. I am proud to know that the number of presented papers from Asia has drastically increased in this decade.
- I tried to offer better service to ISPRS members, particularly information service. I appreciate our Secretary General, Larry Fritz, to have initiated the Annual Report along this policy.

In addition, the team of Council was the best. I believe Larry Fritz was the best Secretary General. Kennert Torlegard was an excellent navigator as the First Vice President. Armin Grün was a theoretical lawyer in charge of the amendment of Statutes and Bylaws as the Second Vice President. John Trinder was the best money collector as the Treasurer. Karl Kraus, Congress Director, was of course the most busy man who never stopped working. So everybody of the Council contributed to the operations of ISPRS office at maximum.

I wanted to resign the Council this time because 12 years are too long for me. However I have to serve the First Vice President for continuity to keep our Society sound and member friendly body. It is sad to know that three of six council members will leave the office. They are Professor Kennert Torlegard, Professor Karl Kraus and Professor Armin Grün. To answer their achievements, I would like to present them a small gift.

Now I also thank Mr. Keith Atkinson and his team of the Financial Commission for supervising the financial affairs. Because of Keith Atkinson, the finances of the Society have been very healthy.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

To my last duty as the President, I would like to hand the presidential collar, this golden chain, to the incoming ISPRS President Larry Fritz. This chain is as heavy as the burden of the President's tasks. During these four years, I could never forget this golden collar because it is not only expensive but also worn by the respective past presidents before me:

Dr. Frederick Doyle: 1980-1984 Prof. Gottfried Konecny: 1984-1988 Prof. Kennert Torlegard: 1988-1992

I am sure that Larry and his new team will lead our Society into a bright and also dreamful direction for the next period. I wish Larry and his wife Evelyn all the best.

Finally I thank my wife Taeko because she supported my family without complaints even though I used to travel almost than 100 days in a year.

This fact clearly demonstrates that ISPRS is truly an international Society. I am very happy that Prof. J. Trinder and Prof. S. Murai will continue in service to the Society. Both have been strong pillars of technical and administrative leadership. Our Society will continue to benefit from their talent and dedication. At this time I would like to interrupt my address to present a Certificate of Appreciation and to share a small token of appreciation on behalf of us all to Shunji Murai for his leadership as our Society's President.

Thank you for your approval!

At the General Assembly I reported on the achievements of our Society during the past four years. Now I would like to express to you some of my hopes for the future of our Society. Our Keynote Speaker and Honorary Member, Prof. Gottfried Konecny provided the operative term for consideration at this Congress - "A paradigm shift." The Resolutions approved by our General Assembly illustrate this shift and will guide us into the next four year term.

Members of ISPRS, we are at the heart of advancing technology for entering the digital era. Our imagery and algorithms represent the lifeblood and the central nervous system of the spatial information sciences. Our ISPRS objectives are to foster international cooperation and communication of the sciences, technologies and applications of photogrammetry, remote sensing and GIS. There are two mutually complementary areas toward which I feel we should direct more sustained efforts.

The first is to strive for a more common identity for photogrammetry, remote sensing and GIS. ISPRS has a long proud photogrammetric heritage but all too often has not sufficiently embraced the complementary disciplines of remote sensing, GIS and related vision sciences. It is time to suppress parochial interests and to unify these component disciplines. The differences between these so called disciplines have been and are continuing to be fused by the technologies we use, so that to a casual observer the differences are now only virtual and our names to the external user community are often quite confusing. Let us abandon these virtual differences. Let us harmonise with technologic change and with our cartographic brethren by presenting a unified face to the world under a common banner as the "Spatial Information Sciences."

The second key area for emphasis by our Society is to expand our efforts in addressing the scientific and technologic needs of the developing world. Council has initiated meaningful relationships and dialogue with the United Nations and many of its organisations. I wish to express our appreciation to the UN Office of Outer Space Affair (OOSA), in particular Dr. Jasentuliyana and Dr. Abiodiun for their most generous support for the travel and expenses of several attendees to the Congress from the developing world, as well as for their contribution to several sessions in the scientific program of this Congress. ISPRS is a member organisation of the Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space, the International Council of Scientific Unions, and the International Council for Engineering and Technology, and we have opportunities for collaboration with the International Council for Social Sciences. It is with such organisations as these that ISPRS can better fulfil its objectives. ISPRS is officially recognised as a Nongovernmental Organisation by ECOSOC the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations and by UNESCO. It is my belief that ISPRS should utilise this privileged position by seeking traditional and innovative ways and means to facilitate opportunities for grants, fellowships, cooperative training activities, and so forth, for our Society Members in an open, equitable and economical way.

In summary, ISPRS has much to contribute to the advancement of our sciences and technology and for the introduction of valuable applications to the global community. Each one of us has an important role to play in helping the world achieve a peaceful and healthy environment as well as a reasonable standard of living for all by addressing our science, technology and applications to solve the needs of humanity. At the same time let us recognise and strive to be tolerant and considerate of cultural differences. The ISPRS officers are a reflection of our Society. We are devoted to address the challenges and opportunities of the future. We must not forget that our ultimate objectives are to apply our collective talents to the needs of all humanity and in so doing help to achieve global harmony and a high quality of life for all.

Thank you for placing your confidence in me and electing me as your President. I wish you all a safe and pleasant journey home.

#### Address of Outgoing Congress Director Karl Kraus

These decisions were made by Karl Kraus as business man.

Now a few words regarding our approach to organise such a big event. We, in the organising committee preferred in

the most cases an approach from the participants point of view. In some cases we combined the drop-down approach with the bottom-up approach.



Now a few words about unconventional things in our programme of the congress:

- In the poster area we encouraged a multilinguistic atmosphere.
- In the exhibition also artists found a place to present their works.
- In most of our tours in Social-Programme and the Programme for Accompanying Persons buses etc. were used. But I gave an example with my bike our, that not always buses, trains etc. were necessary for the tours.
- 4. In the same direction we put pressure on our participants. We recommended to use the public means of transportation and not the individual cars. I am sure that you are now experts in using the modern public traffic system in Vienna.
- 5. I would like to mention that there were two Organ Recitals during the congress. They were not mentioned neither in the First Announcement and nor in the Second Announcement. After we saw light at the horizon of our financial heaven we made the decision, that each participant of our congress can participate in one Organ Recital free of charge. I was informed that this offer was widely used. It was a contrast to the Heurigen and other events. A human being that is my opinion needs from time to time one hour, in which he is alone with the classical music in such surroundings like the St. Stephans Cathedral.

That was my address, thank your for your attention.

And now I have to hand over the Flag of ISPRS to the new Congress Director and I wish him and his team all the best for the hard preparatory work in the coming four years.

- · be not unsensitive, but be open for social matters


These three key statements were the last sentences in this Congress. The Congress is closed.
